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Getting Started at Your School with Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, Inc.

1. Speak with administration for approval of participation in our outreach and use of the parent letter/permission slip. Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, Inc. is a not-for-profit organization with a goal to encourage servicemen and women who are deployed by sending care packages filled with food, hygiene items and letters of encouragement. You may want to mention that you could incorporate this project with your letter-writing curriculum, poetry curriculum, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving (give thanks to a service member) and/or Memorial Day lessons. Students will be applying their language and writing skills in a real-life, meaningful situation

2. Review and revise the parent letter as needed to represent the needs or requirements of your school and/or grade level.

3. Designate a contact person to deliver letters and items to a drop-off location or mail them to Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, Inc. The drop-off locations are listed on the website at www.forgottensoldiers.org. The mailing address is:

5. Forgotten Soldiers Outreach accepts letters and donations all year round. You may choose your level of involvement. Any and all contributions are greatly appreciated!

- Monetary fundraising (see pages 6-9 for examples)

Guidelines for Students' Letters to Soldiers

Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, Inc. Year-Round Letter-Writing Campaign

Have your students apply their language and writing skills while showing compassion and gratitude to members of our Military.

How to Write a Letter:

- At the top of each letter, use the teacher's name and school's return address, so the service member may write back. Please do not put the date on the letter.
- Use a generic greeting such as Dear Service Member or Dear American Hero.
 (We send letters to all branches of the Armed Forces, not just to soldiers in the Army.)
- > The body of the letter must be positive and upbeat. Here are some suggestions:
 - Tell about yourself. (school, grade, sports, hobbies)
 - Tell about a positive current event. (field trip, birthday, a movie you've seen)
 - \circ Ask a question. (What branch of the service are you in? Where are you stationed?)
 - Give a compliment. (Thank you for serving our country. You are very brave.)
- Close the letter with the student's FIRST NAME only.

Teachers:

- ✓ All letters will be proof-read by volunteers at Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, so please do not put letters into individual envelopes.
- Artwork is greatly appreciated. Remind students to draw uplifting and cheery pictures.
 Guns and blood are not appropriate. Please do not use glitter

STUDENTS AT MANATEE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRESENTS \$5,000 TO FORGOTTEN SOLDIERS OUTREACH ON DECEMBER 5TH, 2008

STUDENTS AT WHISPERING PINES ELEMENTARY COLLECTS OVER \$1,800 ALONG WITH ITEMS AND VALENTINES FOR OUR TROOPS TO FORGOTTEN SOLDIERS OUTREACH

Cutler Bay, Florida -- Whispering Pines Elementary School held a "heart-felt" fundraiser drive the week of January 25th for Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, Inc. and presented a check exceeding \$1,800 to Lynelle Chauncey Zelnar, Executive Director and Founder of Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, Inc. and resident of Cutler Bay. A major collection of donated items and hundreds of Valentines to be included in Forgotten Soldiers Outreach's Valentine's Day/February We Care Packages were also presented to Forgotten Soldiers Outreach.

School Drive: Pennies Per Patriot Project Press Release: February 2011

Woodland Middle School, Lake Worth, Florida Instructor, Mr. Organ, 7th Grade Civics Class

PENNIES PER PATRIOT PROJECT

This program started from a simple comment from a student "So what's the big deal about 4,000 dead in Iraq - that's not a lot - you can't even buy a good car for that amount".

It occurred to me (like being hit by a brick), that many middle school students have a concept of just how many of anything represents a large number - particularly that of people who have given their life for America.

To drive home a point, I took a single penny - and declared that "this penny now represents the life of a single soldier killed in Iraq - who will not grow up to raise a family, be a good uncle/aunt to you, or become a productive citizen - and what a shame it is". This can also be applied to a fallen veteran of any U.S. war. My own namesake- Patrick Organ - was a 20-year old that was killed on the island of Iwo Jima.

The penny that I dropped in the bucket was named "Patrick Organ", and the rest is history.

Students at first brought in single pennies, or whatever they had in their pockets -and were actually reverent to the atmosphere of dropping the penny into a large jar. Students emptied piggy banks, cleaned off desks, and emptied pockets to contribute. Many have asked for a moment of silence, gave the jar the sign of the cross, or just pressed their fingers to the side.

This year, 34,430 pennies were collected. A donation of \$ 343.30 will be forwarded to the local chapter of Forgotten Soldiers Outreach.

This is not just a request for pennies. It is a symbolic gesture / educational tool for each student to realize that our fallen veterans are not just numbers for the history books, but that they are real people.

MR. DEPREZ SAID: "The kids were really excited and already have ideas for expanding. Interestingly, a number of other teachers also liked the concept, so next year we hope to include more classes. That said, I hope to keep this a part of my yearly curriculum because I believe it really brought home a lot of the work we have been doing."

The Orange Crushers get together on the last day of each quarter to celebrate their successes and build comradery between team members. This year, we will also be including at least two service projects.

The service projects are intended to:

- 1) Support the community and build citizenship;
- 2) Allow students an opportunity to connect their learning to real-world issues;
- 3) Allow students to see the impact of their work in a real-world context.

This quarter, the Orange Crushers will be supporting Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, an outreach organization for American service people. We will do so through writing letters and running a penny drive. The activities are an extension of work being done in social studies and language arts, focusing on the Civil War and functional text. Our involvement with the charity and activities will all be apolitical.

The classes will all write and edit letters in the computer lab between September 12 and September 20.

Additionally, Honors language arts will design and compose the posters, flyers, and announcements for a three-day penny drive campaign which will be run September 25-27. All classes will help collect the funds and keep a tally.

During team day on September 28, the kids will address their letters and a check for the money they have raised to be sent off to the organization.

Collecting Items for Community Service Hours

When starting a drive or writing letters for Community Service hours please make sure that you include your school information along with your name and address.

- The drive must be an official collection thru the school and/or community.
- Documentation of the drive ie: poster, flyers , etc. with length of time for the drive
- Two (2) hours of community service will be issued for every \$100.00 worth of items collected
- Five (5) additional hours can be earned by hosting a drive for a period no less than one week

Writing Letters of encouragement for Community Service

- Per 5 different messaged letters 1 service hour
- For 20 letters -5 service hours
